Eel Fishing with large black Opera House Traps

Large black opera house traps are an easy and quick method of capturing eels from farm dams. Large black traps come in two types with ring and without ring. With rings are designed with a steel ring to keep out platypus and turtles that can drown in the trap. They will catch eels but with a large opening most eels will find the exit and escape.

We sell large black opera house traps **without** rings, this type trap are specialised and are not allowed in public waters. You cannot use these traps in the wild – you can only use them in your private farm dams. This type trap has a material flap entrance that sits flat, the eel must slide through to enter. Once it's entered the exit sits flat again so it's very hard for the eel to find its way out. These traps are very effective at catching eels in farm dams.

Each trap has a bait bag and it is important to use good bait to attract eels. Just about anything will catch an eel but some baits are far more attractive to them than other baits. The best and easiest baits are fish baits, those that you would use for saltwater fishing. We invariably use pilchards. You can purchase a 2 kg frozen block of pilchards, keep it in the freezer and just pry off 2 or 3 pilchards to stuff them into the bait bag that comes with the trap. Pilchards are great, they send out a scent trail that the eels can follow back to the trap.

These traps are made in China as crab traps. The traps are great and work well but you must understand their limitations. The traps are collapsible and lie flat for transport then fold up and clip together for use. When they clip together they tend to have a gap along the sides that will allow eels to escape. We use a zip tie each side to secure the edges together and remove the gap. This ensures you catch the eels and especially the small ones don't escape. We just cut the tie to remove the eels and resecure with new ties for the next fish. Each trap comes complete with 25 zip ties included free.

The traps consist of lots of twine that is tied with a knot at the end. When an eel enters the trap and is captured it will try and escape after feeding. It will test every knot in the trap using both its head and its tail to push and squeeze through any small crevice or gap. If a weak spot is detected it will keep pushing, plying, thrusting, twisting and wriggling until it makes the hole large enough to escape. The first time you use the trap in 50% of cases the eel will escape as it has tested every knot and found the weak spot. That's okay, just get some twine (see accessories) and sew that hole up and you're back in business and you will get her the next night. Yes, I said her. If you are fishing in freshwater then it will be female eels you will be catching. They are the ones that travel up the freshwater rivers and streams and end up in your farm dams where they stay 10 to 20 years then migrate back to the sea. The males tend to stay in the brackish and saltwater sections of the rivers. Strange but true!

Just tie a rope to the trap, bait it up and throw it into your dam. Try for shallow water around 1.2 mtrs



deep as the eels feed along the shallows at night. Best to set the trap in the afternoon and check in the morning, although you will catch eels during the day, they feed best at night.
